Sun Smart Gardening

height of Gardening in the summer requires a sun-smart approach to protect ourselves while keeping plants and gardens thriving. Summer is a critical time for many plants, with rapid growth, flowering, and fruiting Coastal Gardening Regular care like watering, pest and disease mulching, checks, and feeding herbs and makes vegetables difference in plant health and productivity. Additional tasks, like cleaning bird baths and water bowls, are also important.

To stay sun-safe, aim to garden in early morning or late afternoon, when temperatures are lower and UV exposure is Wear lightweight, reduced. breathable long sleeves, a widebrimmed hat, sunglasses, and spf sunscreen for added protection. sleeves with UPF 50+ certification that effectively block UV rays. Staying hydrated is essential too, so keep water nearby and take regular breaks in the shade. Garden gloves and kneeling mats

Summer and beach life go hand in hand! Many of us love the beachside lifestyle, but gardening in sandy, limestone soils can be a challenge. One of the greatest challenges for coastal gardeners is selecting the right plants for their soils. Here at the nursery, we've created a Coastal Bay specifically for those facing this unique gardening environment. Plants selected for this bay are chosen to meet strict criteria: they need to be hardy, easy to grow, and capable of thriving in both first and second-line coastal positions, as well as in alkaline soils.

Second-line Coastal plants can tolerate some salt exposure but require protection from front-line coastal plants or a dune system to thrive.

Although some plants in this bay are not native to WA, many Eastern state species adapt well to these conditions. You'll also find plants not strictly coastal but capable of handling environments.

When planting from our Coastal Bay selection, remember to prepare soil with soil the improvers, fertiliser, mulch, and a wetting agent.

Whether you're gardening by the coast or dealing with a windy spot high-alkaline with soils, Coastal Bay plants offer resilient, reliable options! - Clare

Birdbaths and Waterbowls

Birdbaths are a low maintenance and easy way to support the birds 3. If possible, add waterbowls requiring at backyard, minimal space. They are your space:



- Placement. Placing your birdbath close to dense shrubbery will give them protection which they can quickly duck into if a predator is around. If cats have access to your garden avoid placing the birdbath next to a fence or tall tree that they can use to pounce on small birds. Keep it in a part shaded area.
- 2. Keeping the birdbath clean. Thrive in Summer Birds can contract diseases from dirty water and might avoid using it all together so refresh the water daily and scrub once a week. Avoid using harsh chemicals as these can can be harmful to birds and irritate their skin. Vinegar works well.

For most of us, creating a garden in Perth begins on hard mode. to sabotage our best efforts before our gardens even amount to anything. I started my garden in Burswood about 3-4 years ago with only sand and builders'

rubble as soil, on a hill, no knee-high irrigation, weeds everywhere, and an average pH of 3.5. Water ran off the top of the sand like wax, and digging into it kicked up dust.

It was tough, but I wanted to prove that, with the right plants and a bit of good timing, you can grow a gorgeous garden in the most extreme conditions.

When initially planting, and about once a month during summer, I douse young plants with a wetting agent solution to make sure water is properly Making a Difficult Garden soaking in. All young plants need extra water while establishing you may need to water every day during especially hot periods - but The climate and soils here seem the effort will pay off once they've settled in.
