### The Beauty and Challenge of Australian Native Plants

As horticulturists, we often hear customers say, "We need tough plants, so we're going with natives." This common belief sparks conversations about the incredible diversity of Australian native plants. With an estimated 24.000 species across country, these plants thrive in a vast range of environments—from the lush northern tropics and arid desert interiors to the temperate regions. years. My favourite part about growing in forests, coastal zones, is mountainous areas, landscapes, native plants offer a wealth of characteristics suited to different conditions.



One key aspect for gardeners to understand is that many native plants remain essentially wild, meaning their needs aren't always predictable. Successfully growing them often involves some trial and error. However, certain native species have been selectively bred for resilience, adaptability, and ease of care, making them ideal for managed gardens. These plants are particularly good when starting a new garden from scratch or for people who are new to gardening.
